From his youth in Australia to career experiences in Europe, Africa, China and across the United States, Terry has developed expertise in business, farming, education, non-profit, the environment, the arts, and government.

In February 2007, Tamminen founded the non-profit organization Seventh Generation Advisors to help other states and world governments adopt clean energy and sustainability polices based on California's successes. That year he was also named the Cullman Senior Fellow for climate policy at The New America Foundation and was appointed as an Operating Advisor to Pegasus Capital Advisors, a private equity fund that provides capital to middle market companies across a wide variety of industries specializing in resource efficiency and sustainable technologies.

An accomplished author, Terry's book, *Lives Per Gallon: The True Cost of Our Oil Addiction* (Island Press), is a timely examination of our dependence on oil and a strategy to evolve to more sustainable energy sources. Jack Bacon has often been called "A New Carl Sagan." He is an internationally-known motivational speaker, a distinguished lecturer (emeritus) of the American Institute of Aeronautics and Astronautics (AIAA), and one of the most requested speakers in the world for topics concerning technology and the factors that shape human society. A noted futurist and a technological historian, he has written three popular books entitled *My Grandfathers' Clock*, *My Stepdaughter's Watch* and *The Parallel Bang*, with many thousands of copies sold of each. A fourth: *Killer Apps for the Green Global Village* is in the works. His lectures have captivated tens of thousands of all ages in thirty-two countries on six continents, and he has appeared on numerous radio and television broadcasts. In his daily work, he is on the management team overseeing the construction and operation of the most complicated technical project in history: the International Space Station.

A graduate of Caltech (B.S. '76) and the University of Rochester (Ph.D. '84) his extensive career includes roles in the development of many cutting edge technologies, including controlled thermonuclear fusion, the development of the electronic office, factory automation, and the globalization of business. He pioneered the deployment of several artificial intelligence systems, learning his craft at the famed Xerox Palo Alto Research Center.

He was the United States' lead systems integrator of the Zarya-the jointly-built spacecraft that forms the central bridge and adapter between all US and Russian technologies on the Space Station. This landmark in technological history was built in Moscow by American and Russian engineers and launched from the Baikonur Cosmodrome in November 1998.

### ▶▶ Community Service Project at the Montopolis Greenbelt

**August 27, 2011, 8:00 AM–Noon**

Montopolis Practice Field, 901 Vasquez St., Austin, TX 78741

On August 27, 2011, the Alliance of Hazardous Materials Professionals and the Montopolis Tributary Trail Association are partnering to clean up trash and remove invasive species in the Montopolis Greenbelt. Provided the resources are available, a mobile laboratory will be set up to gather baseline data on the quality of the soil in the creek bed and pond.

The Montopolis Tributary Trail Association is a group of Montopolis neighbors and friends who have been working together since February 2010 to create hike and bike trails and nature trails and to clean up the creeks and land in the Montopolis Greenbelt.

The Montopolis Greenbelt is more than 40 acres of undeveloped open green space, rich with animal and plant life that is being transformed into an area for public recreational use. This greenbelt has a history of illegal dumping and in rain events the creeks have carried lots of trash downstream onto the land. Many of the invasive species, especially ligustrum, are crowding out and killing the native oaks and elders.

You are asked to participate in this inaugural event as AHMP embarks on its first community service project taking place at its National Conference. Your colleagues as well as students from local Austin colleges and universities will be involved. AHMP wants to support the local communities that host our National Conference by giving them something back. This is an extension of AHMP's CHMMunity Program.

Transportation for AHMP attendees will be provided from the Austin Hilton. Bus will leave Hilton at 7:30 AM and will return at Noon.

#### What to Wear and What to Bring

Wear light weight outdoor work clothes because it will likely be hot. Hard toe shoes are recommended if you have them. Bring a water bottle as we will provide water coolers. Also bring sun block, sun screen, poison ivy block, and mosquito repellent.

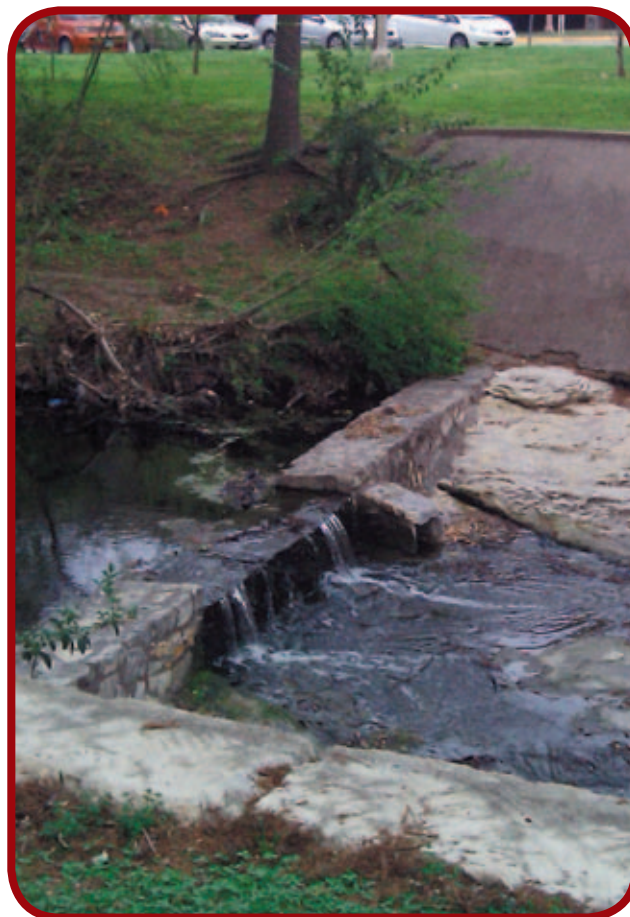
### ▶▶ Emergency Response Scenario

**August 30, 2011, 8:00 AM–11:15 AM**

The DOT estimates that there are over 800,000 daily shipments of hazardous materials in this country. This provides plenty of opportunities for hazmat related incidents. They can happen anywhere and anytime. Most of these accidents are the culmination of a series of errors and usually the result of the unanticipated.

This year's Emergency Response Scenario will be held on the campus of the University of Texas. The driver of a hazardous materials consignment has taken a wrong turn and found himself in a tight spot—literally. The result is chemicals have entered Waller Creek, a body of water that cuts through the UT campus. The UT response team in conjunction with local response agencies answer the call and mitigate the potential damage to the creek and as well as the downstream impacts.

This year's ERS will precede the table-top exercise. The table-top will build upon the response and will not only address how the incident was managed but we'll also consider what impact this incident will have on the transporter and the shipper of the consignment.

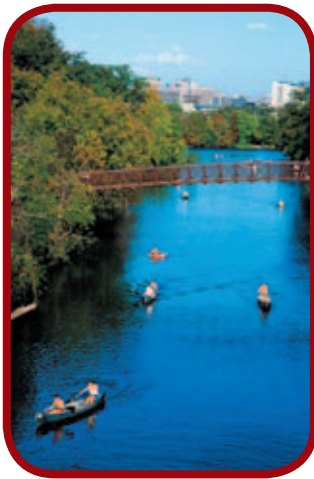

#### **Barton Springs**

**Monday, August 29, 1:30 PM–3:30 PM**

About 2.5 miles west from the Hotel



Barton Springs is located in Austin's Zilker Park not far from downtown Austin. There are four main spring orifices that are the only known habitat for the Barton Springs salamander, a federally listed endangered species. These four springs are the primary discharge point for the Barton Springs segment of the Edwards Aquifer. Main Spring feeds the 750' long swimming pool. There is a dam at each end of the pool; the upper dam directs flow from Upper Spring and Barton Creek

into a bypass culvert so that stormwater flows do not enter the swimming area. Old Mill Spring is just south of Barton Creek about 450' below the lower dam. The fourth spring, Eliza Spring, is adjacent to the swimming pool and is surrounded by a deep concrete amphitheater that used to also be a swimming hole but is now reserved for the salamanders.

In 2008, the fight to preserve Barton Springs was the subject of *The Unforeseen*, a documentary co-produced by Robert Redford, who learned to swim there as a child. The movie uses the struggle over development in the Barton Creek watershed to illustrate the many clashes between private property rights and resource protection that are occurring across the country. The film drew great reviews, but some developers said it went too far and portrays them unfairly. Environmentalists said the movie is not hard enough on those who would develop lands at the expense of common resources like Barton Springs.

#### **Texas Disposal Systems Exotic Game Ranch and Pavilion**

15 miles south of the Hotel between Buda and Creedmore, TX

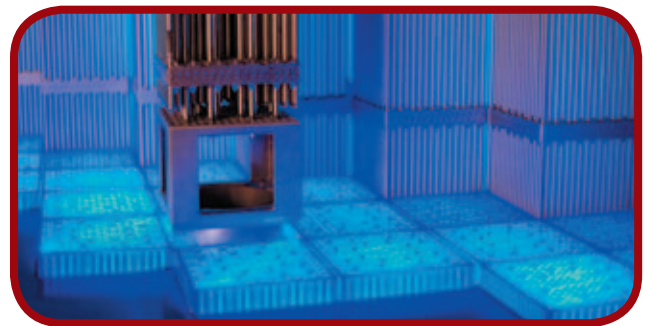
Located in Southeast Travis County, the Texas Disposal Systems Landfill, Inc. (TDSL), the approximately 1,750 acre facility contains the landfill, recycling, composting, and ranching operations. TDSL opened its facility in February 1991, and is now operated under Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) permit #2123. This is the first permit ever issued in Texas for a totally integrated landfill offering a combination of disposal, recycling and composting.

The Texas Disposal Systems Exotic Game Ranch and Pavilion is used as a working ranch and invited guest entertainment facility operation. The ranch land is comprised of land that is under permit for future landfill expansion and a portion of the buffer zone next to the landfill and compost operations. Cattle and other animals are raised and sold. The wildlife reserve is used primarily for animal production and sale to other ranches as well as endangered species conservation.

#### **University of Texas Reactor**

The Nuclear Engineering Teaching Laboratory (NETL) reactor, designed by General Atomics, is a TRIGA Mark II nuclear research reactor. The NETL is the newest of the current fleet of U.S. university reactors. The NETL reactor has in-core irradiation facilities and five beam ports. The reactor is capable of steady-state operation at power levels up to 1 MW or pulsing mode operation where powers as high as 1500 MW are achieved for about 10 msec.

**University of Texas Tower**

University of Texas—Main Campus



The 307-foot tall UT Austin Tower, designed by Paul Cret of Philadelphia, was completed in 1937. Through the years, the Tower has served as the University's most distinguishing landmark and as a symbol of academic excellence and personal opportunity. Gain a new perspective of the University of Texas and surrounding community while visiting UT's landmark Tower.

Reopened after nearly 25 years, the Tower observation deck offers grand vistas of the campus and Austin. Public access to the observation deck is available only via escorted tours due to safety and security concerns.

The 9-inch telescope has a long history with the University. The lens in the telescope is actually older than the tube, mount and dome and was ground a little before the turn of the 20th century by the John A. Brashear company—one of the finest lens makers of the time. The tube and mount were made by the Warner and Swasey Company of Cleveland and was placed in Painter Hall when the building was constructed in the early

1930s. The dome appears green from the outside because of its high copper content, which oxidizes to a patina similar the color

seen on the Statue of Liberty. The inside has been painted but in areas where the paint has chipped, the brilliant original copper can be glimpsed. Unlike most modern telescopes, no electricity is required to operate the clock drive on the telescope. Instead, the drive is wound up to raise a weight which will drop throughout the evening and turn the drive gears.

**Texas Capitol Building**

About 0.7 miles north of the hotel



The Texas Capitol is an extraordinary example of late 19th century public architecture and is widely recognized as one of the nation's most distinguished state capitols. It was placed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1970 and designated a National Historic Landmark in 1986 for its "significant contribution to American history."

Sited on one of Austin's highest points, the Capitol anchors the northern periphery of the downtown commercial district and commands a sweeping view towards the Colorado River from its southern façade. The main campus of The University of Texas at Austin is situated four blocks to the north. Wonderful views of the Capitol's dome from many vantage points throughout the Austin area are protected from obscurity by state law.

In 1993, the \$75 million underground Capitol Extension was completed to the north, doubling the square footage available to Capitol occupants and providing much improved functionality. In 1995, a comprehensive interior and exterior restoration of the original building was completed at a cost of approximately \$98 million. Finally, in 1997, the park-like grounds surrounding the Capitol were given a much needed \$8 million renovation and restoration.

The Bob Bullock Texas State History Museum in downtown Austin, Texas, tells the "Story of Texas" with three floors of interactive exhibits, the special effects show, The Star of Destiny, in the Texas Spirit Theater, and Austin's only IMAX Theatre, featuring the signature large-format film, Texas: The Big Picture. A 35-foot-tall bronze Lone Star sculpture greets visitors in front of the Museum,

and a colorful terrazzo floor in the Museum's rotunda features a campfire scene with enduring themes from Texas' past.

### Bats down town under Congress Avenue Bridge

Directions available at concierge

About 0.5 miles SW of the Hotel (walking distance)



The Congress Avenue Bridge spans Town Lake in downtown Austin and is home to the largest urban bat colony in North America. The colony is estimated at 1.5 million Mexican free-tail bats. Each night from mid-March to November, the bats emerge from under the bridge at dusk to blanket the sky as they head out to forage for food. This event has become one of the most spectacular and unusual tourist attractions in Texas. The most spectacular bat flights are during hot, dry August nights, when multiple columns of bats emerge.

### 2011 DOT/IATA Highway and Air Refresher

49 CFR 172.704 and IATA Section 1.5 require training for anyone involved in any aspect of preparation of hazardous materials for shipment including checking the work of others who perform these activities. These regulations require refresher training at intervals not to exceed three years (the interval is two years for shippers of international air packages). Lack of training and insufficient training garner fines from DOT inspectors frequently, and the damage to one's reputation as a shipper can do irreparable harm to one's career. In this class you will be made aware of recent changes in regulations and guided through a variety of highway and air shipment examples to demonstrate these changes and good practices. Prior to training day, you will receive training materials by email. On training day, you will receive the newest editions of 49 CFR and IATA that are available, you will be tested as required by the regulations, and you will receive a certificate that is ready for your employer's signature certifying you as a trained hazmat employee. Please note that this class is a refresher class and assumes that students have already mastered "the basics" of hazmat shipping.

### Toxic Gas Hazards—Ammonia Risk Management Practices Across Industry Sectors

NH<sub>3</sub> is one of the largest tonnage chemicals and is extensively used in agriculture and in many industrial applications. Its onsite storage has been the reason for filing 50% of Risk Management Plans to the EPA. Although the safety record for NH<sub>3</sub> use has generally been quite good, accidental releases have continued to occur during the last several decades from accidents in transportation and stationary use facilities. These accidents have caused business disruptions and serious injuries in the work place and offsite to the public.

To adequately control the hazards and be prepared to respond to potential releases of NH<sub>3</sub>, appropriate risk based decisions must be made by those:

- Who design/install/operate and maintain facilities with NH<sub>3</sub>,
- In government who regulate facilities and respond to hazardous materials releases,
- Who work or reside near NH<sub>3</sub> use sites.

The regulatory requirements, consumption levels, supply chain/transport network in the US for NH<sub>3</sub>, and the relative magnitude of onsite inventories will be described for the primary uses for anhydrous NH<sub>3</sub> as a fertilizer/fertilizer intermediate, and in various industry sectors—chemicals, metals, electric power, pulp and paper, bioprocessing, electronics, water utilities, food processing and commercial refrigeration.

The history and causes for accidental releases will be discussed and examples given of various changes made related to chemical substitution (aqua ammonia, urea), engineering controls (binary fluid refrigeration, ammonia containment, exhaust gas scrubbers), and administrative controls (improved mechanical reliability/integrity, system lockout procedures) to more effectively manage the risks and mitigate potential consequences from releases.
